The Year 2022 in Review



SIUE Charter High School Presentations

The Society began its initial community events in January 2022, with Society organizer and East St. Louis Historian Reginald E. Petty making presentations on February 14 and February 28 in the Learning Center of the SIU Edwardsville Charter School building on the campus the former East St. Louis Higher Education Center, now known as the Wyvetter H. Younge Education Center. The Society collaborated with this group for several additional presentations..

To continue the Black History theme, five additional members of the Society performed during Black History month. On February 15, 2022, Dr. Lillian A. Parks shared thought provoking Black History facts with the attendees. Ms. Redina Medley performed a crowd-pleasing original monologue entitled "Harriet Speaks from Way Up Here." Mr. Norman Ross enthralled the audience with a presentation on Africa and its influences on world history. Finally, poet, playwright, and author Jaye P. Willis delighted the crowd with an original kwansaba (a poetic artform created in 1995 by Dr. Eugene B. Redmond, Poet Laurette of East St. Louis, IL) entitled Praying for Prey, a tribute poem to the memory of Mr. Michael Brown. On February 22, 2022, Mr. Robert 'Bob' Gill presented an informative lecture on the History of East St. Louis.

On March 23, 2022, Dr. Andrew Theising lectured on Reparations of Past and Future to a room capacity crowd. Continuing the series, Ms. Billie G. Turner regaled the students and faculty with information on her families "Migration to East St. Louis" on June 29, 2022.

Oral Histories and Youth and Young Adults

A multitude of other activities took place during this time. Oral histories were facilitated by Ms. Medley with Dr. Lillian A. Parks and Mr. Willie King. The Society collaborated with the SIUE-East St. Louis on their 2022 Juneteenth celebration, with presentations by board members Mr. Ross and Ms. Medley. Members Medley and Willis also collaborated with East St. Louis Senior High School's Poetry Slam contest. Mrs. Willis served as guest poet and Ms. Medley served as a judge.

Our Youth and Young Adult Initiative also featured activities with local youth who assisted with Mrs. Retta's 2022 Health-Wealth Fairs, hiking near the Forest Park waterfall, and several others. There are six dedicated youth working with initiative lead Ms. Medley, including Byronica Harris, Ronasia Harris, Raymond Smith, Devonte Morgan, Tayden Goodwin, Tayla Goodwin and Sincere Simmons.
